Adopt A Pub

Why?

WhatPub is CAMRA's national database of British pubs, and every branch is tasked with keeping up to date the entries for the pubs in its area. When that task is complete to CAMRA HQ's satisfaction, it is awarded 'gold' status. Anyone can consult the database by visiting whatpub.com, though only accredited CAMRA members can amend it.

One of our branch aims this year was to raise all our entries for real ale pubs on WhatPub to gold status. With a terrific effort from our team of CAMRA stewarts this was achieved.

However, the task to keep all the information on the pubs up to date cannot be maintained by a few members. We would like to ask all members that use a pub regularly to "adopt" it. This would involve reporting changes and events at the pub. Not in some big brother spying way, but rather in a more casual way. We have ~40+ real ale pubs in our branch and over 800 members. It would be nice to have someone for each pub. Don't worry about picking one that already has an adopter, the more the merrier. All verified changes will be passed to WhatPub.

WhatPub is encouraging more people to go to the pub, and to go to the pub more often, which is the primary objective of Key Campaign 4. Encouraging pub going will make a major contribution to ensuring that more pubs remain economically viable and that will keep more pubs open.

WhatPub will only continue to be a success and attract even more visitors if the pub information is complete and accurate. The primary responsibility for updating WhatPub lies with branches, but all members can help. When you use WhatPub you can log in using your membership number and password, then you will see at the top of each pub entry a Submit Updates button. This brings up an online form, which when submitted sends your updated pub details by email to the member(s) in the relevant branch who keep WhatPub up to date. Please check WhatPub to see if the pubs near where you live are up to date, and if they are not, please send an update to your local branch. Similarly send updates when you are on holiday.

When you are in the Pub REMEMBER to score your beers!

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Spoons for Sale?

Wetherspoons is disposing of 54 pubs nationally, according to CBRE, a major agent for commercial properties. These include the Secklow Hundred here in Milton Keynes, Barker's Draft in Bedford, and Moon on the Square in Northampton. According to the website [ThisIsMoney.co.uk](http://thisismoney.co.uk), the most likely buyer is Luton-based Stonegate pubs, owners of the Slug and Lettuce and Yates chains, and currently Britain's biggest pubco. Many of the pubs Wetherspoons are shedding duplicate other Spoons outlets in the same town or city, but others are in places, like some small Scottish towns, where real ale - or even decent craft keg beer - is as rare as the proverbial hen's teeth, and the local Wetherspoons the only place where good beer could be had, often over a quite large area. Will the new owners, whatever they turn out to be, show the same commitment to real ale as Wetherspoons has done? Not without trepidation we await developments, because if a company with the drive and experience of Wetherspoons cannot make pubs pay, who can?

Have you Scored yet?

CAMRA's National Beer Scoring System (NBS) is an easy 0-5 point scale for judging beer quality. It is used to find out which pubs consistently sell well kept ale. The results help us to decide which pubs to consider for the Good Beer Guide.

All CAMRA members can submit beer scores for any pub in the UK.

Please go to whatpub.com and log in using your membership number and password. Locate the pub's web page. If you are using the desktop version, Beer Scoring appears on the right hand side of the page. If you are using the mobile version, click on the Submit Beer Scores tab.

Enter the date that you visited the pub, the name of the brewery and the name of the beer. Using the scale below, select your score. Once complete, click on Submit Score.

0 No Real Ale	No real cask-conditioned ale available.
1 Poor	Bear ale is available from cask but this is unlikely to be cask-conditioned/recently drawn.
2 Average	Competently kept, caskable ale but there is little to distinguish it from other well-conditioned ale in nearby pubs and you don't notice any particular quality.
3 Good	Good bear in good form. You may notice slight improvement in the bear pub. You might say it's another pint similar, just slightly better aged.
4 Very Good	Excellent bear in excellent condition.
5 Perfect	Probably the best you are ever likely to find. A balanced ale with no flaws and scores very rarely.

NEWS EAST

Red House, Newport Pagnell is under new management. Beer Mobs says goodbye to Dabs O'Reilly and welcomes new landlady Brenda Gibson to this thriving community pub.



NEWS WEST

King's Head, Buckingham is being refurbished as we go to press with a provisional reopening date of Saturday 28th November. Expect a new look inside and out, with new signage, improved toilets, and a new kitchen. Real ale will be retained.

NEWS SOUTH

Tawny Owl, Walnut Tree now has five real ales on permanently according to our spy. Recent beers have included Titanic Plum Porter, Robinsons Unicorn, St Austell Proper Job, Brains SA, and Hook Norton Hooky as well as the usual Greene King range and GK seasonal and regional beers such as Gargly Ghoul and Harry & Hanson's Bitter.

Wheatsheaf, Bow Brickhill, has a new licensee following several months of temporary management. Beer from Homes brewery, just a few hundred yards down the road, has been sighted on the bar.

NEWS CENTRAL

Eight Belles, Bletchley. Our mystery drinker reports: Pie, mush, and lager in Bletchley? Surely not? Yes, it's true! That London delight is being served every Monday from 6pm. Pies are sourced from Manors of Walthamstow. No need to book. Also available to takeaway.

'Also Craft' Teas are available Mondays - Saturdays. This time it is bookings only; you'd want your scores to be freshly made, wouldn't you?

Middleton Pavilion, MK Village, has been forced to drop cask conditioned beers due to their limited opening hours. According to our spy, they have however installed a

dedicated tap for Concrete Cow's MK IPA, so at least the craft-beer is local.

Suffolk Punch, Heelands As we go to press, the application to demolish this now long-closed pub has been withdrawn, and the developers met with the council planners on November 23rd to ascertain which type of application might be viewed favourably by them and the locals. Beer Mobs will report on the outcome as it becomes known.

Victoria Inn, Bradwell Village, we've had lots of reports of good quality real beers featuring on the寒opis here, including Bucks Star Homes, Towcester Mill and Vale.

BREWERY AND CIDER NEWS

Amphill Good news! This brewery, that closed earlier this year, has been reopened as Amphill Brewhouse by a consortium of locals. Under lead brewer Mary and Pete Jeffrey, the brewery has launched with a range of three beers, Session Ale (3.4% ABV), Golden Ale (4.1% ABV) and Indian Pale Ale (4.5% ABV). See amphillbrewhouse.co.uk for more info.

Bucks Star, who had their official opening in August (see p14), have unleashed their second beer Tap (3.5% ABV) in bottles and cask. Speaking to brewer Dan at the Concrete Fint festival, he's already planning a third beer which is likely to be far stronger and much darker than the brewery's initial offerings. The brewery is also hosting a regular beer club run by MK Food Revolution. The first event took place on November 20th featuring a selection of local beers and the second event is due on December 10th when Christmas beers from around the world will be sampled. Admission is by ticket only, available via www.mkfoodrevolution.org with only 15 spaces per event. Fans of take-away beer to drink at home should check out Bucks Star's 'Eco-Growlers', refillable two litre glass containers. They'll be happy to help you fill them too.

Concrete Cow Currently in the MK beer scene comes from Concrete Cow, who continue to have success with their MK IPA (5.0% ABV), an intense Shiraz and Oliva hop bomb available only in can and keg. The 2015 version of brewery's seasonal Winter Ale is available now in bottle and cask, a dark beer spiced with seasonal spices to get you in a festive mood. Brewer Dan has also teamed up with Laurence Gunister at Worf Distillery and Cidery to set the wheels in motion for MK's first whisky. A batch of his ale has been fermented and distilled into malt spirit, and is now sitting in wooden casks to mature... Roll on 2016!

Gin Dog Ales, Woodford Halse, have produced their first Christmas beer with orange peel, ginger, raisin and

Cotswold Distillery whisky added to the brew. With the suitably Dickensian name Bah! Gundog! (4.7%) it is available now in bottle and cask, so look out for it in your local.

Haresfoot Brewery, Berkhamsted, have also jumped on the festive bandwagon with a limited edition seasonal brew available in the form of Festive Spirit (5.0% ABV).

Hart Family Brewers of Wellingborough have a special seasonal treat for boozed beer fans, in their Kimber Reserve Imperial Russian Stout, which they describe as 'a cheeky 9.2% ABV'. Sounds just a little more than cheeky to us! It should be available during December.

Hornes Brewery have been having a good first year. They had the first cask to run dry at the Concrete Pint Festival and took third place in the public vote for Beer of the Festival with their Porter. They followed this up by winning the 'Best Set of Labels' title at the Labelologists Society's national awards for the Triple Goat range, designed with local company White Leopard. The brewery has also been visited by Ian Stewart, MP for MK South, which has resulted in an invitation to supply beer to the House of Commons' Strangers' Bar in 2016. Brewer Ryan is already planning a fourth beer, which is likely to be a standard bitter.

Leighton Buzzard Brewing Co have made it two in a row, coming second in the Beer of the Festival contest at the Concrete Pint, this time with their wonderful Smokey Angel smoked porter. If you liked it, or missed out and want to try it, you can now buy it in bottles. The brewery also has two new beers available. The first is Bedfordshire Best (4.1% ABV), a pale bitter brewed for Friends of Bedfordshire Society to celebrate the first ever 'Bedfordshire Day' (28th November). The second is Xmas (4.5% ABV) – three guesses what it celebrates!

Tring Brewery offered a special beer for November called Calsal (4.1% ABV), brewed with New Zealand Green Bullet hops. For December, look out for Santa's Little Helper (4.0% ABV) and Old Chestnut (4.2% ABV), not to mention their fine warming barley wine, Death or Glory (7.2% ABV). The brewery is ageing some new kit for experimental brews – sounds like 2016 could be interesting!

XT at Long Crendon have been improving their brewery, adding a dedicated tasting room and a brewery shop. On the beer front, they have a seasonal special, 25 (4.6% ABV), a burgundy AllBitter slow fermented for a smoother deeper flavour. Their Animal Brewing offshoot offers two seasonal brews: Rudolf (4.5% ABV) is a cappuccino stout brewed with special 'Silverback Espresso' from Dusty

Ape Coffee. Robin (4.6% ABV) is a rich, malty ruby ale available only in bottles.

Virtual Orchard cider have released their 2015 version of Cider Clausa, the seasonally spiced medium cider that can be drunk warmed or cold. It sits alongside the latest vintages of the regular range of ciders plus the new Coachbuilder range of ciders infused with various fruits and natural flavours such as toffee.

Regional Pub of the Year 2015



The Regional Pub of the Year award 2015 went to the Rising Sun in Berkhamsted. On Friday 23rd October the certificate was presented by Nick Boley, Central Southern's Regional

Director, witnessed by the pub's customers and CAMRA members from surrounding branches.

The Regional Pub of the Year is judged by ordinary CAMRA members from across our Region, which comprises Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and part of Hertfordshire who assess each pub in the regional final. For this award a pub is assessed not only for the quality of its real ales and ciders, but also for whether it has a convivial atmosphere, offers service which is efficient and friendly, is a vital part of its community by, for example, supporting local events and local sports teams, attracts young and old alike, promotes CAMRA's aims and values, and overall provides a good-value experience.

Each of the eleven branches in our Region can submit a candidate for Pub of the Year and this year the Rising

Sun scored more highly than its competitors, taking it through to the next round of the competition to find Britain's Pub of the Year 2015.

This free house has one regular beer, Riser Bitter brewed by Tring, plus four changing beers that offer the visitor a chance to try real ales not often available in this area. There are also fifteen real ciders and perries and bottled French cider complemented by an extensive range of unusual spirits and liqueurs.

The Rising Sun hosts many events throughout the year including quizzes, four beer and cider festivals, a cheese club and a pop-up restaurant.

In his presentation Nick Boley congratulated Nigel and Mark, the Rising Sun's licensees, for the success they have had in the eight years that they have owned the pub and commented on the regular events held there, mentioning particularly a recent Macmillan coffee morning with a superb selection of cakes.

Buszwords

We're coming to the end of my second year as Public Transport Officer for the Branch, so I thought I would take this opportunity to reflect on the last twelve months.

At our AGM in January, we decided to form the Social Sub Committee comprising the Social Secretary, the Branch Secretary and the Public Transport Officer. Between us we devised a social calendar for the year with the aim of visiting as many of our 138 real ale pubs as we could. One of CAMRA's Key Campaigns is to raise the profile of pub going and to increase the number of people using pubs regularly. Many of Britain's pubs are closing every week through lack of trade.

We aimed to use public transport as much as possible to avoid drinking and driving. Most pubs within Milton Keynes can be reached by bus and a walk of under ten minutes from the bus stop. On many of our Social outings, we visited two or more pubs that are close together and, for the small towns in our Branch, we arranged a Saturday pub crawl that we hope will continue as an annual event. In February we visited four pubs in Olney and Emerson, in April we took the bus to Hanslope for the beer festival at the Club plus a visit to the two nearby pubs, in July we visited seven pubs in Winslow and Padbury, in September it was five pubs in Stony Stratford and October seven pubs in Buckingham. In November we travelled to Newport Pagnell for an evening crawl and called in at up to six pubs. In March we plan to go to five real ale pubs in Fenny Stratford.

Pub visits by public transport are easy to organise: any number of people can attend; people can join in and leave at any time they wish, so they don't have to call in at every venue.

But what about our rural pubs that are not served by public transport? We haven't neglected these. On several occasions we have hired a minibus to take us around the villages with real ale pubs. This has to be organised and planned well in advance. It is essential that we cover the cost of hiring the bus, so the price to each individual is higher than the price of an Arriva or MK Metro day ticket. Happily, we have had enough interest to make these trips viable. We have even been joined in some of these villages by the members who live there but find it difficult to get to other events without having to drive.

January 2016 sees our next AGM where all Committee posts come up for election. Whatever the results, I'm sure that next year's social calendar will continue to support CAMRA's Key Campaign and promote many of our pubs. For details of all events, local and further afield, please



Branching Out

This issue's featured pub outside our Branch area but accessible by public transport and well worth a visit is the Albion Brewery Bar in Northampton. Home to the Philippe NBC Brewery, the bar offers a choice of Phillips-NBC and Hoggley's beers plus guest ales and real cider on draught. CAMRA members receive a 10% discount. There are eight hand pumps in all and there is a good selection of bottle conditioned beers.

The Bar reopened at the end of July after a lengthy refurbishment. A glass screen was added between the bar and the brewery giving drinkers a view of the beer in production, but most original features have been maintained. The building has a striking ceiling above the Victorian cast iron roof supports.

Along the front of the bar are bar stools and plush covered bar chairs. There are wooden bench seats and bentwood chairs at the tables, some of which are separated by screen dividers. The room also has a Northamptonshire settles table and a bar billiards table.



As well as a fine selection of real ale and cider, the Bar has a varied menu that includes hand cut chips, soup, meat pie and mash, meal and veggie burgers, cury tagine and, the day I visited, lamb en croute, which is butterflied lamb shank marinated with herbs and spices. The Albion Brewery Bar is open from noon until 4pm

Sunday and Monday, until midnight Tuesday to Thursday and until 1am Friday and Saturday. Food is served until 9pm Wednesday - Saturday and until 4pm Sunday. (Details correct at time of writing, but please check www.philips-nbc.co.uk for any changes.)

The Albion Brewery can be reached by bus or by train with a short walk (under 10 minutes).

By bus, take the X4 or X7 from Milton Keynes shopping centre or rail station. Alight at Cotton End Level Crossing and walk towards the town centre, crossing Old Towcester Road, St Peters Way and Commercial Street, the brewery is on the left in Kingswell Street just past the King Billy. If you are unfamiliar with Northampton bus stops, you can stay on the bus to the bus station. Exit the bus station by the passenger waiting room. Cross Bradshaw Street

at the lights and turn immediately right walking parallel to the bus station. Turn left into Colclough Street. Cross Gold Street into Kingswell Street following the street to the bottom of the hill. The brewery is on your right on the corner of Foundry Street, just before the King Billy. Return buses leave from the Drapery and Cotton End (across the road from the Pint Pot Arms). The last bus back to MK leaves the Drapery at 18:50 Monday-Saturday and 18:40 on Sunday.

By train, leave Northampton Station turning left onto Black Lion Hill and go straight on into Mersalair then Gold Street. Turn right into Kingswell Street following the street to the bottom of the hill. The brewery is on your right on the corner of Foundry Street, just before the King Billy. Trains back to MK run until late in the evening.

An exciting day for founder and brewer, Dafis Go, began with the arrival of a film crew from ITV Anglia News to interview Dafis at the brewery. Once they had the footage, it was off to the Three Locks near Stoke Hammond to film several customers enjoying a pint of Bucks Star No. 1. Late afternoon back at the brewery invited guests started to arrive for the opening ceremony. The beer flowed freely as guests mingled, many enjoying their beer outside in the sunshine. After showing groups around and giving an explanation of the brewing process, Dafis addressed the crowd before handing over to Jenny Elway, CAMRA's Brewery Liaison Officer for Bucks Star Brewery. Jenny spoke about Dafis' involvement in CAMRA and the planning and hard work that he had put into setting up the brewery and producing its first beer before cutting the ribbon and declaring the brewery officially open.



After the formalities, Dafis and his singing group entertained us with familiar songs whose words had been changed slightly to extol the virtues of beer. Beer, sunshine and song – the perfect end to a perfect day.

During the evening, members helped make sure the CAMRA Good Beer Guide is what it says it is by scoring the quality of the ales they sampled in each pub on the WhatPub? website. Inclusion of a pub in the GBB is based on how well its beers score throughout each year so it's important that all CAMRA members, every time they visit a pub, should use this site to feed back on the beer they drink.

These CAMRA 'tours' are always welcome in the pubs they visit, and indeed two of our hostesses, Molly in the Cannon and Emma in the Bull, laid on free and much appreciated nibbles for us.

A number of free pints, now to some from other parts of our Branch area, were visited, some very nice ales and others supped, and a good time had by all whilst waging a Key Campaign for CAMRA. You could join us next time – keep an eye on *Moose* or our Branch website for details.

Art Is An Ale

Whenever I visit France I resign myself to the fact that I may not find any decent beer during my stay. Whenever I am pleasantly surprised to find an establishment that serves the unexpected, I feel compelled to notify Beer Moose so that others who venture to the same French town can head straight for bars that delight the beer lover.

I recently spent a week in Carcassonne. In the square called Place Carnot, where there are a number of restaurants with tables and chairs in the open on the square, is a bar called Le Cochon



Noir which serves about a dozen Belgian bottled beers including Duvel, Chimay Rouge, Chimay Bleu and Kwak. They range in price from 5 euros to 7 euros a bottle. To aid our dégustation, we ordered a plateau charcuterie et fromage, a selection of serrano ham, chorizo, salami, omelette and camembert, with crusty bread, to share for 11 euros. Not far from Le Cochon Noir, in Rue Georges Clemenceau between Place Carnot and the railway station is Bar Le BH. There are about twenty different bottled beers, mainly Belgian, that include Delirium Tremens, Mout

Sabine, Barber and two locally brewed bières artisanales. The first one I tried is called Doria Garcas, the lady after whom, according to legend, Carcassonne is named. It is a blonde beer flavoured with honey and has 6.6% ABV. The flavour is rich and well-rounded with a hint of hoppy bitterness. The second beer called Adèle is very hoppy and refreshing and has 5.5% ABV. These two beers were 3.50 euros each and the other bottled beers in Le BH are between 3.50 euros and 5 euros.

The third place I found to drink enjoyable unusual beer is a restaurant called Chez Fred in Boulevard Omer Sarraut, near the junction with Rue du Docteur Alphonse Tostey. The beer is listed as bière artisanale on the menu and changes regularly, depending on what is available from their supplier. The evening we dined there, we were offered a blonde beer with muscat or an amber beer. We both chose the amber. I thought that amber was a misleading description because the beer was very dark, almost black. It was quite like a Belgian dubbel and we both enjoyed it. Unfortunately, I don't remember the name of the beer, its strength or how much it cost, but that particular beer may not be available when others go there, although there is bound to be something interesting in its place.



