

Craft and Cask

JRED IN THIS ISSUE

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Buckingham Pubs No, that's not the name of a pub somewhere, but refers to an issue which CAMRA needs to address sensibly, and address soon. That issue is craft beers.

This is a new development which has come to us from places like the US and New Zealand, and refers to intensely flavoured, and usually rather strong beers, often brewed by skilful and dedicated small brewers (hence the 'craft'). Typically they are cold-matured and heavily dry-hopped, and not pasteurised, relying on heavy hopping as a natural preservative, but they're filtered before leaving the brewery, not conditioned in the cask, so by CAMRA's definition cannot be considered real ales. But – they taste sensational.

You will find craft beers in bars like the Euston Tap, and their most vocal British proponent is the feisty Scottish brewer BrewDog. Your editor recently found himself in BrewDog's Camden Town bar, and was bowled over by the sheer delicious brilliance of the beers there. The public seems to agree, and is voting with its feet and wallets for, unlike other pubs nearby, the bar was packed to bursting-point on its two floors even in mid-week, and overwhelmingly with young drinkers.

For me, the most important aspect of a beer is its taste – its flavour. The technology used to achieve that flavour must be a means to that end, not an end in itself. When CAMRA was founded in 1972, the only means then available to make beer taste good was cask-conditioning, as anyone who can remember the fizzy keg abominations foisted on us back then by the Big Six brewers (remember them?) can attest. But technology moves on, and I think we must confront at least the possibility that the best craft beers can now match our beloved cask ale in flavour.

So should CAMRA redefine real ale to include the crafts? I don't think so – the two are quite distinct. But, just as we support cider and perry, I think we should welcome the newcomers as separate but equal, and unashamedly enjoy both. What do you, our readers, think?

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

CAMRA is a founding member the European Beer Consumers Union (EBCU). This was formed in 1990 to represent beer consumers throughout Europe, and co-ordinate the activities of national beer consumer organisations in the member states. Beer is the national drink of many European countries, so the EBCU manifesto calls on the EU to:

- Preserve and promote Europe's beer and brewing heritage
- Support Europe's well-run pubs and bars
- Protect European beer consumers' rights
- Treat beer and wine equally

The EU classifies wine as an agricultural product but beer as an industrial one, hence growers of hops and malting barley miss out on the support given to their equivalents in the wine business.

Parliament Unanimously Passes Fair Deal for Pubs Motion

After a lively debate in the House of Commons, MPs unanimously passed a motion on 12th of January criticising the Government for a lack of action on pub companies, and requiring it to commission an independent review of self regulation in the pub sector. Over 5,000 CAMRA members had contacted their local MPs asking them to support this motion.

Three Trees, Bletchley reopened on Dec 17th, refurbished, restyled and rebranded as the Tudor Pub at the Three Trees. The new guvnors are Louise Carey and Jason Massingham. April is Community Pubs Month

Local pubs are at the heart of countless communities across Britain. In April, CAMRA launches a new campaign, Community Pubs Month, to champion them and highlight their importance.

Beginning on Monday April 2nd - Community Pubs Day - its aims are to increase footfall in pubs, encourage publicans to stage events to attract further trade, and make the media aware how important community pubs are. Licensees can order packs of free promotional material direct from CAMRA or from their local branch. The packs, available now, include campaigning posters, beer mats, leaflets and pump clip crowners. Britain's suburban Pubs under threat

CAMRA is calling for urgent Government action to save

Britain's pub culture. New figures released in January show that every week across the UK 16 pubs close their doors for good, particularly in suburban areas, A new report by the Institute of Public Policy Research (IPPR) calls on Government to recognise the important community function many pubs perform. Its recommendations include business rate relief for pubs acting as 'centres of a community', reform of planning laws which currently allow pubs to be demolished without need for planning permission, and an option for all pubs to become free of tie, accompanied by an open market rent review.

IPPR Associate Director, Rick Muir, said: 'Our research shows community pubs aren't just places to drink, but support many important local services as well.' The report is available to download from www.ippr.org.

Vale Brewery of Brill has launched a new venture, Aylesbury Brewhouse, behind their Hop Pole pub on Bicester Road. The Brewhouse brings brewing back to Aylesbury after a gap of almost 75 years. The original Aylesbury Brewery Co Ltd ceased brewing in 1937, and its beers were thereafter all brewed in Burton.

Buckingham boozers by bus - a drinker's publi

We're back on the buses for this issue's public transport guide and heading for a location you could be forgiven for thinking was an ale-free zone. A quick look through the current Good Beer Guide will reveal a grand total of zero pubs listed in Buckingham town centre, so it can't be worth visiting, right? Well no, actually that's wrong! The town has a wealth of good pubs serving quality ales and all are within a few minutes walk of the bus routes.



The Mitre is the furthest from the beaten track, as you'll need a 15 minute stroll past the University to find it. Situated on Mitre Street, just around the corner from a tall railway viaduct, the tidy exterior gives way to a traditional bar that is both cosy and deceptively spacious. They've managed to cram in a variety of pub games and a few TV screens, but they're not too intrusive. To the rear there is an attractive and tranquil beer garden, where occasional beer festivals are held. At the bar you'll usually find an interesting selection of ales on the four handpulls, including a house beer brewed by Silverstone. They also offer something of a rarity, a real lager from Cotswold Brewery, which has recently been joined by Cotswold's cider. Do take care when entering and leaving the pub though, as even Snow White's seven friends could fall victim to the very low doorway!

Heading back into town towards St. Peter & St. Paul's Church, you'll find another of Buckingham's gems, the Woolpack. Tucked away in Well Street, just off the busy main road, you'll find a pub that offers something for almost everyone. There's a large family-friendly garden backing onto the river



and high quality food. A selection of four ales, frequently including a LocAle or something a little more obscure, spans the bar's four handpulls. The main room has a minimal yet comfortable feel, a theme that's been continued into a recently refurnished outbuilding. An airy room to the rear offers a more traditional feel. Look out for their beer festivals, typically held twice a year.



Heading out on to Bridge Street and up the hill, you'll find a proper drinker's pub across the road in the form of the **Three Cups**. If gastro-pubs and plush interior design do nothing for you, you'll appreciate the down-to-earth simplicity this long narrow boozer offers. There are some tables and seats, a few screens for the sports fans, and a small bar. As a free house, the ales could be from just about anywhere, and a recent visit uncovered a couple of brews from LocAle Vale Brewery, both in good condition.

Just around the corner is the White Hart, with a bold frontage that gives way to an impressively large interior. A traditional style hotel bar, you'll find it full of dark wood, brass and mirrors, with some

stained glass at the back of the long main room. If you exit the pub via the beer garden, you might miss the Three Cups completely! Beers tend to come from regional breweries, but don't be surprised if you find something that's not available elsewhere in the town.



Crossing the main road and heading back towards the church again, the town's second large hotel bar is hidden away on Castle Street. The bar is behind the main reception at the Villiers Hotel and can also be accessed directly via a side entrance. This is a far more modern affair, obviously targeting diners but offering a good selection of well known regional beers from its four handpulls. The plush interior isn't reserved for the bar alone either, as you'll discover if you need to spend a penny.

Retracing you steps a little and heading for the Old County Gaol, you'll find our final two suggestions close together above the square on Market Hill. Until recently, the Whale had been something of a scruffy spit-and-sawdust boozer with an array of handpulls offering just a single beer. However, a new landlord and a refurb in 2011 have given the pub a new lease of life. The lower seating area is now bright and stylish with large comfortable sofas. Up the steps in the bar, the transformation has been more subtle. Although still a Fuller's tied house, the beer range has been extended beyond London Pride and the quality has picked up too.

Finally, stagger a few hundred yards further and you'll find refuge in the King's Head. There's usually something from Greene King on offer, plus a guest beer. Most of the pub has minimalist decor with wooden floors, but the smaller area away from the pool table offers more traditional comfort. Maturer drinkers will notice some familiar names on the collection of bar trays dotted around the walls. Do watch out for the live bands and other musical entertainment on some evenings, which may have you reaching for a set of ear plugs.

Helpfully, the main bus stops are just yards from the King's Head. Most parts of the town and many local villages have bus services that use these stops. For those travelling from Milton Keynes, there are two main options. Arriva's 32 service runs Mon–Sat until 5pm and is included in the MK Day Saver ticket, making a visit ridiculously inexpensive. As a bonus, the local 32A circular route is also included, which enables you to visit the Wheatsheaf, a current Good Beer Guide entry in Maids Moreton. If you need to travel after 5pm or on a Sunday, the Stagecoach X5 service now stops in the town centre. It's more expensive, but offers a longer stay and often has facilities for relieving a weary bladder.



So why aren't any of these pubs in the current *GBG*? As a branch, Milton Keynes and North Bucks CAMRA can only contribute 13 pubs to the *GBG* from 200-plus inside our boundaries. As the *GBG* is all about beer quality, we use the National Beer Scoring System to discover which pubs consistently serve the best quality beer. The scores are often very close indeed, and every year there are pubs that miss out by very small margins. You can help in the selection process by submitting beer scores regularly – see details elsewhere in this issue, or visit our website.

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Branch Trip to Ea

On Saturday 21st January, a group of us made a pilgrimage to east London. The reason for the trip was to present Brodie's Brewery with their Beer of the Festival award for Hackney Red, which was voted best beer at our Concrete Pint festival in October, and then enjoy an east London pub crawl. We were met at Walthamstow tube station by Brodie's Brewery Liaison Officer, Marion Robbens, and her friend Pete, who are both members of East London and City Branch of CAMRA, and were to be our escorts for the day.

They took us first to **Ye Olde Rose and Crown** in Walthamstow; East London branch's Pub of the Year in 2011. This traditional pub has a good choice of real ales, and on that day had four on tap including Titanic Steam Whistle and Orkney Red McGregor. It also has a theatre, which is unusual for any pub outside the West End, and an original mosaic floor which depicts the Rose and the Crown.

From there, we took the short bus journey to the William IV in Leyton which is the home of Brodie's. Some of us thought we had died and gone to Heaven when we walked in - sixteen beers were on tap, including many one-off specials, and all at just £1.99 a pint! This pub's also a great place to stay, with rooms from just £45 a night.

Here we met co-owner Lizzie Brodie who led us behind the pub into the brewery, We were told how in June 2008 Lizzie and her brother Jamie took over the abandoned King William IV hotel and bar on Leyton High Road, which also included a defunct brewery at the back. After six weeks hard work cleaning, replacing missing equipment, and fixing up what was left, Brodie's beers were born. Brodie's IPA was first brewed on the 8th August based on a recipe that Jamie used to brew in his bath at home! It proved to be a hit with the punters. Three years on they have brewed over sixty different beers but now brew only twelve regularly. They brew most days and sometimes twice in a day to keep up with demand. We went back into the pub where festival beer purchaser Chris Scoggins and I presented



Lizzie with the certificate. We then drank a toast to our absent friends, and then some of the group (best unnamed!) decided to try all of the beers available.

Eventually we left, and walked a couple of hundred yards to the Drum. This pub was one of the first to be opened by the now vast JD Wetherspoon empire. Its small and cosy interior contrasts dramatically with the large drinking barns normally associated with Wetherspoon, perhaps reflecting the chain's evolution over the years. It has a single room layout, but thanks to the room's irregular shape, the split level bar area at one end, and the position of various pillars, it feels more compact and intimate than you might expect. There is a conservatory and garden area at the rear. Here we only (!) had a choice of 10 beers including Oakham JHB, two Redemption beers and one from Great Oakley, as well as the Wetherspoon regulars.

From there we went on a fifteen-minute bus ride to Leytonstone where, after a short walk, we arrived at the North Star which is an excellent East End style community pub that extends a warm welcome to all. There's a good choice of six well-kept real ales although I failed to list them all as the pub was very busy. I managed a half of Redemption Urban Dusk before we moved to the Walnut Tree, which is a Wetherspoon outlet, but in total contrast to the Drum. Some had a quick half of something in this uninspiring pub; others didn't bother. We then walked to the Red Lion in Leytonstone High Road. This refurbished pub, formerly called Zulus, had a great selection of beers from the likes of Redemption, Thornbridge (including Jaipur IPA) and East London breweries. I drank another of our festival favourites - Redemption Big Chief, From here the group split up, as some (and not the ones you would expect) decided that they had no capacity for any more beer and went off back to Euston and home to Milton Keynes.

The remaining six of us went on with Marion to Stratford City, a new shopping complex in touching distance of The Olympic Park, and East London's latest brewing venture, the Tap East Pub & Brewery, which is situated on the edge of the shopping complex, Inside, the shining copper vessels of the brewery can be seen through a big glass viewing area. They sell both keg and cask beers, and we tried a couple of their own brews. Alas we were all too tired and slightly inebriated to appreciate this for long, so having bade farewell to Marion and Pete, we made our way through the shopping centre to Stratford International tube station and on to Euston for the 8.40pm train home to Milton Keynes.

A great day was had by all who attended, and we are indebted to our new friends Marion and Pete. We have agreed to try and go back later this year and sample some more of this wonderful life. Marion has also said she will bring some of their branch to our festival in October and I plan to arrange a trip to East London branch's festival in December. Watch this space!

Have you Scored yet?

CAMRA's National Beer Scoring System (NBSS) is an easy 0-5 point scale for judging beer quality, and to find out which pubs consistently sell well-kept ale. So we invite all real ale drinkers, not just CAMRA members, to send us their beer scores for pubs both in our area, and elsewhere in the UK. We forward scores for out-of-area pubs to the relevant branches. These results help us decide which pubs to consider for the Good Beer Guide.

E-mail your scores to us at pubs@mkcamra.org.uk, bring them to any of our meetings or social events, or submit them online at www.beerscoring.org.uk .You'll need to give your name, CAMRA Membership Number (if you're a member), Date of Survey, Pub's Name and Location, Beer Name and Brewery, and of course, your score.

0 Undrinkable	No cask ale available, or so poor you have to take it back or can't finish it.
1 Poor	Beer that is anything from barely drinkable to drinkable with considerable resentment.
2 Average	Competently kept, drinkable pint but doesn't inspire in any way, not worth moving to another pub but you drink the beer without really noticing.
3 Good	Good beer in good form. You may cancel plans to move to the next pub. You want to stay for another pint and may seek out the beer again.
4 Very Good	Excellent beer in excellent condition.

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
