

New Inn, Padbury - beautifully modernised country pub serving a rotating choice of often local real ales in excellent condition.

Stratton Arms, Turweston - landlord invites branch members to his pub, which serves five ales at all times, with a beer festival on Sat 5-Sun 6 Sept featuring 20 to 30 micro-brewed beers. The lease on this Enterprise Inns house is no longer for sale.

Three Horseshoes, Drayton Parslow - business reportedly doing well thanks to B&B lettings.

Wheatsheaf, Maids Moreton - had the first brew of Silverstone Chequered Flag, a dark, sweet tawny-coloured ale that may become a regular alongside the best-selling Black Sheep Bitter and Tring Side Pocket for a Toad. Landlord Gary has installed a fourth handpump, and the pub enjoyed a very successful beer festival over the bank holiday weekend.

Woolpack, Buckingham - held its usual successful beer festival over the Bank Holiday.

News South

Bridge, Fenny Stratford - heavily advertised as Medina's Bar & Grill, it actually sells real ale – a

choice of two, usually Greene King IPA plus a guest. Chequers, Fenny Stratford - Pub has now been bought by Vale and sells their LocAles. Landlord John Shaddick (left) will continue to run the pub and says his regulars seem to like the ales from Brill.

Old Green Man, Little Brickhill - has reopened with new licensees Steve and Natasha Barney. We welcome them to our branch area and wish them a prosperous tenure at this nicely modernised Greene King tied house.

Red Lion, Fenny Stratford - exciting real ales being sold, and landlord Guy has also installed a fourth handpump serving Westons real cider.

Three Locks. Stoke Hammond - seems to have taken on board advice to stock at least one beer of under 4% ABV, although in our view the ales tend to be served too cold.

Wheatsheaf, Bow Brickhill - is now Cask Marque accredited. Licensees Chris and Susan James now have four handpumps, but don't always use them all. Wells Bombardier and Eagle, and Youngs Bitter are usually available.

News Central

Barn, Central Milton Keynes - has enthusiastic CAMRA-supporting manager Marcus Lonsdale, and is also Cask Marque accredited. Changing choice of ales from Marstons portfolio - they were in good shape on two recent visits.

Cross Keys, Woolstone - offers four Wells and

Fox and Hounds, Stony Stratford - is scheduled to re-open on September 24th (subject to repairs being completed), with new landlords Paul Hale and Sam Lancaster. They aim to restore the main features to how the pub was five-ten years ago.

Grebe, Great Holm - new landlords have sadly dropped beers on sale from five to just one - Greene King IPA.

Nag's Head, Great Linford - is under new management and has greater range of food than before but no change to the ales - still Tetleys, Fullers, Adnams and Greene King.

New Inn, New Bradwell - is now Cask Marque accredited, and business is improving under the new landlords. This pub was recently the victim of a suspected arson attack.

North Western, Wolverton - is now Cask Marque accredited and thriving, having picked up the customers of the still closed Queen Victoria. It had four ales on the Sunday evening when we called, including guest beer Lees Scorcher.


Plough (aka-Fountain), Loughton - this Harvester pub's planning application to add a two-storey extension and conservatory has been approved.

Ship Ashore, Willen - new manager has reduced number of real ales to three, but we've heard that the quality is now much better.

The Punter's Tale....

thoroughly recommend anyone to visit the Great British Beer Festival, held every August in Earls Court, London. With over 500 different beers to choose from, you will quickly understand why this is the world's greatest beer festival.

Nearly 70,000 visitors came this year, many of them from around the world. They did not only come to sample the different beers on offer, but also participate in the tutored beer tastings, shop in the different merchandise stalls - selling such things as humorous t-shirts, travel guides and bottled British beers - as well as playing some traditional pub games, such as shut-the-box. There are many different food stalls to soak up that beer, as well as being a convenient spot for meeting friends.

However, there are tips of advice which could make your trip to next year's GBBF more enjoyable:

- **1.** Book time off work you can only appreciate the Festival if you have the whole day to yourself and not worry about having hangovers at work the following day.
- **2.** Come early for opening time so that you can grab a table and chairs because those seats do go quickly, otherwise you will have to stand for the whole day.
- 3. Hire a few glasses because the Festival is so big, you may need to buy a few beers at a time to bring back to the table otherwise there will be long and frequent walks to the bars.



- **5.** Take turns to wander around, because there is so much to see at the Festival. This year there was an exhibition by Kent brewers Shepherd Neame: it explained how beer is brewed, showing the different ingredients used, with beer being fermented in see-through tubes, how it is stored in the casks and of course, a sample of their products.
- **6.** Come prepared there is a fabulous website to browse: www.gbbf.org.uk you can also send live updates to your Facebook and Twitter accounts.

Not only is GBBF fun, but there is also a serious campaigning aspect of the Festival. CAMRA supports a tax cut on low-alcohol real ales and is trying to save the Tetley Brewery in Leeds from closure. Also a mild ale won the Champion Beer of Britain prize, which goes to show that the some of the drinking public prefers dark traditional beers and that these are worth promoting.

The Volunteer's Tale....



ot every customer at the Great British Beer Festival immediately realises that the biggest beer festival in the world, attracting 70,000 customers, is organised and staffed entirely by around 1000 unpaid volunteers. That's right, apart from the stallholders, everyone serving, stewarding, cellaring, issuing glasses, running games alleys, everyone working at GBBF is doing it without pay, just for love of real ale.

CAMRA provides accommodation in student residences (often many miles form Earls Court), and there is a free staff bar upstairs in the Volunteer Village to which the public is not admitted, but that's all. Your editor has worked at four GBBFs now and can hardly wait for the next - it's hard work, with long hours, but it's fun, and you make lots of friends, and get a real buzz. So what's involved?

When you sign in on arrival in the morning, the efficient ladies in the staffing office (also volunteers) allot you a task or tasks for the day. In the days before the festival opens, eager teams set to work converting the huge empty space of Earl's Court into a Beer Festival. There are vast areas of bars and stillages to build, casks – masses of them – to load in the correct places, beer lines and cooling systems to install, stalls to set up. Much of this is done by teams with skills like joinery, electrics, and



driving fork-lift trucks, but there is masses that can be done by the cack-handed as well!

Every day the festival is running, bars have to be cleaned, glasses washed, and customers served — this year 20,000 came on the Friday night alone! Once 'time' is called there is much clearing up to be done before everyone makes a dash upstairs to enjoy several well-earned pints at the staff bar before the coaches come to take you back to wherever you are staying.

On the Saturday, the festival closes to the public at 7, but it's not time to relax yet, as all the beer lines have to be disconnected and flushed clean, hundreds of handpumps taken down and boxed up, and as much dismantling done as possible before the staff party can begin. And on Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday, we have to take down and remove everything, and hand an empty Earl's Court back to its management (see photos above).

From this you might conclude that working at GBBF is an ordeal, but you'd be utterly wrong – it's great! Why else would a thousand people donate a fortnight of their summer to work there year after year? All CAMRA members are invited to volunteer. I certainly plan to do so again in 2010. See you there?

CAMRA Reaches 100,000th Member Milestone!

CAMRA is thrilled to announce a landmark moment in its 38-year history as membership tops 100,000.

Mike Benner, CAMRA Chief Executive, said: "We are overjoyed at reaching 100,000 members, but while we celebrate, the hard work of campaigning for drinkers' rights will continue."

CAMRA was formed in 1971, published the first Good Beer Guide in 1974, organised its first local beer festival in the same year, and the first Great British Beer Festival in 1975. In the view of many, CAMRA is Europe's most successful single-issue consumer organisation

CAMRA Launches 'People's Pint' Campaign

CAMRA has launched a campaign to abolish excise duty on beers of 2.8% ABV or under.

Alcohol Concern has expressed support; its chief executive, Don Shenker, commented: "We support CAMRA's call to revisit the issue of alcohol duty in order to encourage the drinks industry to produce lower strength beers."

Ray Welton, whose Surrey brewery produces 2.8% ABV 'Pride 'n' Joy' said: "There is certainly a consumer demand for low-strength beer, but there needs to be a national campaign to champion its merits."

CAMRA toasts Best Beer in Britain

After a year of local tastings and regional competitions, and a final judging at the Great British Beer Festival, Rudgate Ruby Mild, from York, has been voted Champion Beer of Britain 2009.

The 4.4%ABV beer is described in CAMRA's Good Beer Guide as a 'nutty, rich ruby ale, stronger than usual for a mild.'

It beat over sixty finalists in seven categories (Best Bitters, Bitters, Golden Ales, Milds, Speciality Beer, Winter Beer and Strong Bitters). The Silver award went to Oakham Brewery for their Attila ale (which was also voted Champion Winter Beer of Britain in January), and the Bronze was taken by Dr Hexter's Healer from West Berkshire Brewery.

One of our LocAles – VPA from Vale Brewery at Brill, won Bronze in the best bitter category. Milton Keynes drinkers can enjoy it at the Chequers in Fenny Stratford.

Titanic Stout from Titanic Brewery, Stoke-on-Trent was voted Champion Bottled Beer of Britain for 2009, and as part of a pioneering new sponsorship arrangement will be sold by Travelodge in 100 Bar/Cafés in its hotels across the UK.

CAMRA's Super-Complaint Prompts Office of Fair Trading Probe into Pub Market

Under the Enterprise Act 2002, a recognised consumer body like CAMRA may submit a 'super-complaint' about any aspect of a market for goods or services in the UK that significantly harms the interests of consumers. The OFT has 90 days to respond, and if the super-complaint is upheld, can introduce legally binding measures to rectify the situation.

CAMRA has exercised its super-complaint power to require the OFT to investigate anti-competitive practices in the UK pub market. Its super-complaint 'A Fair Share for the Consumer', highlights how high rents and inflated tied beer prices are driving many good landlords out of business, and contributing to the destruction of Britain's pubs


Mike Benner, CAMRA's Chief Executive, said, "Exploitation of beer tie agreements and the unfair method of setting pub rents are harming consumers. It is enshrined in EU law that consumers must get a fair share of the benefits arising from exclusive purchasing deals such as the beer tie, but this is often not the case. We hope that the OFT will act, because reform of the beer tie is urgently required to save the pub from extinction."

Going POTY with CAMRA

Every year, CAMRA branches are invited to pick a pub in their area as Pub of the Year, or POTY. Our worthy choice for 2009 was the Victoria Inn in Bradwell. Previous winners have included the Lamb (Stoke Goldington), Cannon (Newport Pagnell), White Hart (Sherington), and Robin Hood (Clifton Reynes).

Our pub is then judged against those chosen by other Buckinghamshire CAMRA branches, and the chosen County Pub of the year assessed against Oxfordshire's and Berkshires's choices to give a Regional Pub of the Year. From those a National Pub of the Year is chosen – officially it becomes CAMRA's best pub in Britain.

A team of volunteer tasters and judges from our branch had the pleasing task of visiting the candidate pubs in our CAMRA region to sample their ales and facilities, and cast our votes for the regional POTY. We can't tell you the results till they are officially announced, so keep watching our website www.mkcamra.org.uk for the winner.

Everv October. CAMRA celebrates real cider and perry (i.e. cider made from pears). As with real ale, the ethos behind CAMRA's promotion is that real cider is unpasteurised and uncarbonated. It is produced from pure juice (not concentrate) made from fruit grown in the UK. Locally produced ciders and perries have a provenance, i.e. their raw materials can be traced to their origins unlike factory-produced fizz.

The reason why we celebrate cider in October is because it is timed to coincide with the

harvest, a time when the fruit is gathered and pressed before it is fermented into cider and perry. It also ties us in with Common Ground and other organisations that tirelessly defend Britain's dwindling orchards.

A number of events are planned nationally, such as the announcement of the CAMRA National Cider Pub of the Year, and the National Cider Trip on Saturday 10th October, featuring many different producers.

This year, Gwatkin Yarlington Mill Cider and Broadoak Perry won Gold in the CAMRA National Cider and Perry Competition. If you cannot find either of them in your pub, why not give other real ciders and perries a go? Westons cider is more widely available, but the closest producers to our region include Millwhites from Hertfordshire, whose Yarlington Mill cider won Bronze in the CAMRA East Anglia competition; and Rockingham Forest from Northamptonshire, who make a cider from eating apples (as opposed to special cider-making varieties grown in the West Country, e.g. Yarlington Mill) and a limited run of perry.

Oakham Brewery Visit

At our 2008 Concrete Pint Beer Festival, the ale voted Beer of the Festival was Three Witches, brewed by Oakham Ales. Despite its name, this brewery is actually in Peterborough, so on July 4th a party from Milton Keynes and North Bucks CAMRA branch drove there in a minibus to present the award.

We were received by head brewer John Bryan, to whom our festival organiser Carl Dillow presented the certificate. The group then proceeded to enjoy a leisurely crawl round some of Peterborough's excellent pubs, including Oakham's own Brewery Tap, and Charters, the latter being on large barge moored on the River Nene.

Other pubs visited included the CAMRA national-inventory-listed Hand and Heart (a free house), Palmerston Arms (Batemans), Wortley Arms (Sam Smiths), Drapers Arms (J D Wetherspoons), and the



Milton Brewery-owned Coalheavers Arms, whence our minicoach ferried us home to Milton Keynes after a most pleasant day out. Our thanks go to Kevin Mak for arranging it all.

According to Oakham's website, Three Witches is 'Amber in colour with a fruity orange aroma, soft fruit notes combine with a grainy background to a fruity dry finish.' We couldn't have said it better!
