

Unit pricing for alcohol has been in the news a lot recently. We know that many pubs are currently struggling to stay in business. How could minimum unit pricing help them?

CAMRA believes that a minimum price per unit of alcohol, set high enough to stop supermarkets selling alcohol at a loss, would encourage people to drink in the regulated and social environment of the pub.

When Aylesbury Vale and Wycombe CAMRA branch drew up a chart showing where a 50p unit price would fall, they found that the only real ale affected was Wetherspoon's 99p-a-pint Greene King IPA.

Pubs, with their unavoidably higher overheads, can never match supermarket prices. While the off-trade persists in undercutting pubs, real ale drinkers will suffer a steady loss of places to enjoy their favourite tipple. If unit pricing brings drinkers back into pubs, we should support it wholeheartedly.

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Belgium Beckons

Next day we paid a repeat visit to scenic Bruges to allow those unable to come last year to experience this jewel of Flanders, but all too soon we had to pile back into our coach for the journey home. We celebrated our return to British soil with a very agreeable visit to Wetherspoons in Ashford.

Once more, our grateful thanks to Doug Dillow for organising this second trip to Europe's other great ale-brewing nation.

For England and St George! Bedecked with bunting, The Red Lion at Fenny Stratford's canal lock celebrated St George's day - April 23rd - with patriotic fervour! Throughout the day, epic English sporting triumphs, selected by landlord Guy Plumb, were re-lived on screen, including such landmark events as the 1966 England v Germany world Cup Final, 1993 England v Australia rugby World Cup, and 2005 Ashes Series. An assortment of suitably national music was also played.

News North.

Hanslope Wassailers 2009 Summer Ale and Cider Fest kicks off on Saturday 4th July - Independence Day - at the **Globe**, **Long Street**, **Hanslope**. The festival runs from noon till midnight on the four days from Saturday through till Tuesday. Queen's Oak morris men will dance the event in on Saturday night, and out on Tuesday evening.... Also in Hanslope, the Watts Arms has a new email address: thewattsarms@tiscali.co.uk. Landlady Pauline offers two regular cask ales (Wells Eagle IPA + guest) and hopefully a third soon. And at the Greyhound, Haversham landlord Barrie now sells four cask ales, GK IPA & Abbot plus two regular guests, and always stocks Old Rosie cider. We have had no further news on the long-closed Carrington Arms, Castlethorpe, other than rumours it may be turned into flats.

News East.

Beer Moos has heard unconfirmed rumours that the Green Man, Newport Pagnell, once a fixture of the Good Beer Guide, may be converted to residential use. New landlords at the Rose & Crown, Newport Pagnell have taken out the dartboard in the lounge and replaced seating with

comfy sofas. A village campaign has persuaded Charles Wells to put the **Swan at Sherington** up for sale. As we go to press, we understand a buyer may have been found. **The Lamb, Stoke Goldington** has an exciting summer program of events planned. On Saturday 13 June there's a one-day Music and Beer festival with seven bands, barbecue, and lots of real ale. Entry is £5 and the event runs from 1 till 9pm. On Wednesday July 8 at 7.30pm the Stony Steppers Clog and Morris dancers will perform. Call Steve or Rachel on 01908 551233 to find out more. The closed **Crown in Olney** now has planning permission to make alterations (it's a listed building) and is rumoured to become an Indian takeaway.

News West.

The Mitre, Buckingham no longer sells Fosters and Stella, and now stocks Cotswold lager. This is brewed near Chipping Norton to German purity law standard, and is lagered for four weeks like the best continental beers. As always, the pub has an exciting program of music gigs, including a Beer and Music festival on August Bank Holiday weekend. Phone Matt, Keith, or Jane on 01280 813080 to find out more. The Wheatsheaf, Maids Moreton has added Silverstone as well as Tring beers to its regular LocAles. Landlord Gary also hosted a very successful nine-ale beer festival over May Bank holiday. Still in Buckingham, the Woolpack held its usual Spring bank holiday festival, with eight real ales and two real ciders to help the hog-roast go down. Another festival is planned for August Bank Holiday. At Preston Bissett the White Hart now takes Concrete Cow beer, while the New Inn, **Padbury** is back in business after suffering damage when a vehicle crashed into it.

News South.

Following a meeting of Aylesbury Vale DC, the **Old Crown, Little Horwood** is undergoing valuation to prove if the asking price set by the freeholder is reasonable: if so, then the change-of-use application is likely to go ahead. If not, then we understand that the freeholder may be forced to set a lower asking

price to bring out more offers, possibly to keep the pub open. As we went to press, the **Old Green Man, Little Brickhill** was found to have closed; we understand that this may be only until a new owner is found. New landlords Chris and Susan James have taken over at the **Wheatsheaf, Bow Brickhill** selling Eagle IPA and Youngs Bitter, occasionally adding another Wells and Youngs beer, and the **Three Locks, Stoke Hammond** now offers six mainly regional real ales.

News Central.

Beer Moos welcomes the new licensees Dennis and Pauline Leinieks to the New Inn, New Bradwell who are offering Wells Eagle IPA, Bombardier, and Courage Directors on hand pump, fine food in restaurant and bar, and a friendly pub dog to welcome and keep the customers amused! The Pilgrims Bottle at Great Linford local centre, which has been closed for many months, has now reopened as an Sri Lankan restaurant. New landlord Paul Hepworth has taken over the Cross Kevs. Woolstone and intends to raise the profile of real ale. The Grebe, Great Holm is under new management and now regularly stocks five cask ales. And one-time Good Beer Guide stalwart, the Fox and Hounds, Stony Stratford is still waiting, as we go to press, to reopen as the Kremlin Wine Bar.

What's in a Name

Ubu

Delicious 4.5% ale from Purity brewing of Alcester, Warks; this ale is named after faithful hound Ubu (pronounced OO-BOO), whose "picture" is also shown on the pump clip. According to the brewery's website Ubu is 'our faithful/feared canine friend, protector of our secrets.' A sketch of the little dog appears on the Ubu pump clip, and on the label of the bottled version. Beer Moos has been informed that Ubu is an acronym for Useless Bloody Urchin. And there was your artsy-fartsy editor thinking it referred to Ubu Roi, the hero of an 1891 play by the French surrealist writer Alfred Jarry....



MOOSINGS FROM THE CHAIR

Since CAMRA campaigns for drinkers' rights, you might be surprised that we were actually supporting the Chief Medical Officer's proposal back in March to charge a minimum of 50p per unit of alcohol (see front page.)

It's because we try to promote quality, not quantity, and it's drinking cheap booze in quantity that causes the problems that are all too familiar in our society. Also, we are on the side of pubs, and no pub sells any alcohol for that little. Only Wetherspoons with their pound-a-pint Greene King IPA promotion comes close.

Incidentally, Wetherspoons did not have to strike a new deal with Greene King to offer their promotion - the beer was already less than £1 per pint wholesale (far less than what GK's tied pubs have to pay). The Bury St Edmunds brewers were reportedly upset that Wetherspoons were cheapening their brand. Could it be that they themselves were cheapening their brand by selling it for so little?

A Wheely Great Day Out!

A highly enjoyable day was had by all who marked Local Pubs Week with a Redway pub crawl by bicycle on Saturday, 28th February.

The crawl began at the Victoria Inn at Bradwell Village, our Pub of the Year for 2009, where joint landlord Dave supplied a hearty breakfast. The intrepid troupe of 29 riders then set off on a southward loop to sample the beer at seven more hostelries before finishing at the Moon Under Water in the Snowdome. Visited on the way were J D Wetherspoon's on Midsummer Blvd, the Old Swan at Woughton-on-the Green, Plough at Simpson, Red Lion at Fenny Lock, Caldecotte Arms, and the Cross Keys and the Barge in Woolstone.

The object of the trip was to raise the profile of local pubs, and have a great day out in the process. Both objectives were magnificently achieved, and for the first time we were covered in the local press. This was the crawl's fourth year, on a new route this time, and the best attended – 29 came on the ride and others joined us at the pubs. 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Pub of the Year 2009

VICTORIA, Bradwell Village



It would to that as in most new

towns, the Milton Keynes urban area is hardly

supplied with good real-ale pubs. The Victoria stands out in our city like the proverbial good deed in a naughty world, and is a very worthy winner of its award.

Following its success as runner-up last year, the Victoria Inn at Bradwell Village has been voted Milton Keynes and North Bucks CAMRA's Pub of the Year 2009.

Perhaps best described as a village pub in the city, the Vic, as it's universally known, was once the local for one of the villages swallowed up by the Milton Keynes conurbation. Small and vibrant, it has an friendly, enthusiastic, and faithful local clientèle and is deeply engaged in the life of its community in Bradwell and farther afield, with pub quizzes (your editor is in the team!) pool and darts matches, coach trips, music gigs, karaoke nights, and all the many activities of a lively community pub.

The Vic is a true free house and is run by real-ale enthusiast Dean Davies, assisted by partner Val, father Dave and staff. It holds frequent beer festivals, and celebrated May is Mild Month with a mild festival that lasted most of the month, with a mouth-watering choice of unusual light milds as well as the more familiar dark ones. Excellent and reasonably priced food is a feature of the Vic, but most of all it's a pub serving a rotating selection of superb real ales, in tip-top condition, and very competitively priced. Unusually for this area, there's always real cider as well. Real ale now outsells lager at the Vic, and Dean has had to install an extra handpump to meet demand!

A Pub to Remember

One of the pleasures of going to CAMRA's national AGM is the chance to visit pubs in parts of the country where you've never been before. Such was your editor's experience when, from Eastbourne, I took a bus to the exquisite downland village of East Dene, home of Beachy Head Brewery, and their delightful pub The Tiger Inn. This beautifully restored and extremely friendly tavern stands on the traffic-free village green. It serves excellent and very reasonably priced - home-made food, and acts as brewery tap for Beachy Head ales.

If any Beer Moos readers find themselves near the East Sussex coast, a visit to the Tiger is heartily recommended. Buses 12 and 12A between Brighton and Eastbourne take you to East Dene, and the pub is in the old village, a very short walk from the stop.

CAMRA says - "Stop this beer tax insanity"



shows that the 18% beer tax increase by Government has forced real ale prices up by an inflation-busting 5.5% since February 2008. Independent free houses are the worst affected, with prices rising by 6.2% in the last year.

70,000 people have signed up to Axe the Beer Tax campaign, and 25,000 have contacted their MP to

call for a freeze on beer taxation and abandonment of plans for annual above-inflation beer tax hikes. The 'Axe the Beer Tax - Save the Pub' Campaign was launched in November 2008 by the British Beer & Pub Association, and CAMRA. Our branch members did it fullest justice!

Appropriately, beers from the southern counties featured prominently, augmented by a clutch of visits to some of the breweries where they were made. Harvey's of Lewes proved a popular choice, as did Dark Star, whose delicious HopHead was Cellarman's Choice at our Concrete Pint Beer Festival in October 2008.

Next year's AGM is held on April 16-18 in Douglas, Isle of Man. Not only does the island apply a German-style beer-purity law to its brewers; it is also home to some of the most unspoilt and idiosyncratic pubs —



and some of the loveliest scenery - in the British Isles, so a memorable weekend is guaranteed. Flights (from Birmingham and Luton) have limited space, the sea-cat from Liverpool is less constrained, but even so you will need to book well in advance, no later than October. The isle of Man's superb public transport - vintage stream trains, Edwardian trams, and modern buses - ensures that you can pub-crawl your way round the whole island on a day or weekly travel pass.





A Keg on the Road to Real

This true, but little known story in brewing history, comes with a health warning! It is not about Real Ale. It is about keg beer, and a massive national brewing and pub owning company

Back in the early 1970's my husband and I were pub managers for St. George's Taverns, a division of Watneys. Our pub, the Lewes Road Inn, was less than a mile from the former Tamplins' Phoenix Brewery in Brighton. One day, the rep popped in to say that there had been a "mistake in brew", resulting in a beer that was neither Special nor Red Barrel. Nevertheless, Watneys were not willing to throw away a rather large quantity of perfectly good ale, so it was going to be sold in a few of the local pubs, being marketed as a limited edition beer, under the name of Watneys Export Red.

We duly took delivery of the aforementioned brew, which was served from a spare keg font in the Lounge Bar. I found it so pleasant, that after a while, I stopped reminding the Public Bar customers of its existence, as I wanted to drink it myself! It was not long after that, that I discovered Gales Horndean Special Bitter, a real ale, served by beer engine, and so began a whole new era of my beer appreciation!

Editor's Note on Watneys: For readers under a certain age, this notorious company - long passed unlamented into history - was one of the six giant combines that dominated brewing in Britain back in the 60s and 70s, the others being Allied Breweries (formerly Ind Coope, now Carlsberg), Courage and Scottish & Newcastle (now merged and owned by Heineken), Bass (now Coors), and Whitbread. Watneys perpetrated the infamous Red Barrel keg beer that Jan mentions, and it was these Big Six's policy of replacing real ale with pasteurised, artificially gassed keg beer that prompted CAMRA's founding in 1972. It's interesting that, out of the Six, both Watneys and Whitbread abandoned brewing altogether, and the others have ceased to brew real ale, selling or sub-contracting their few remaining real ale brands to other brewers.

Concrete Cow Brewery Visit

Fenny Popper had been ordered, and brewer/proprietor Dan Bonner also racked off some of his new Cowzat cask lager, plus Lazy Daisy - a "mistake" brew of over-sparged Ironbridge, dry-hopped to give a remarkable aroma. Cowzat, named to sound


like "'owzat" in cricket. is brewed with lager malt and lager hops, and is very drinkable. and ideal for the summer.

The brewery is located in Bradwell Abbey, and has a 5.5-barrel brew length. Dan bottles 20-30% of his output though he would rather sell everything in cask. The group hugely enjoyed their visit,



thanking Dan for the snacks provided, and the excellent ale, and look forward to seeing Concrete Cow beers in even more outlets in our branch area. There is no beer that is more LocAle!

Have you ever wondered how CAMRA selects pubs for the Good Beer Guide? The National Beer Scoring System (NBSS) is an easy 0-5 point scale for judging beer quality in pubs. We use it to find out which pubs consistently sold well-kept ale over the previous year, and invite all real ale drinkers, not just CAMRA members, to send us their beer scores for pubs both in our area, and elsewhere in the UK. We forward scores for out-of-area pubs to the relevant branches.

0 Undrinkable	No cask ale available, or so poor you
	have to take it back or can't finish it.
1 Poor	Beer that is anything from barely
	drinkable to drinkable with
	considerable resentment.
2 Average	Competently kept, drinkable pint but
	doesn't inspire in any way, not worth
	moving to another pub but you drink
	the beer without really noticing.
3 Good	Good beer in good form. You may
	cancel plans to move to the next pub.
	You want to stay for another pint and
	may seek out the beer again.
4 Very Good	Excellent beer in excellent condition.
